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Short biographies of external speakers

Stuart C. Gilman is currently the Programme Manager for the United Nations Global Programme Against Corruption and is Head of the UN Office on Drugs and Crime's Anticorruption Unit. In this role he is responsible for effective implementation of the United Nations Convention Against Corruption. His work has focused on integrity and anticorruption systems in government and the private sector. During his academic career he taught at several prestigious universities. In 2002 he was appointed the President of the Ethics Resource Center (ERC). His leadership at the ERC resulted in close consultation relationships with senior executives and integrity offices. Dr. Gilman has been an ethics consultant for state governments and federal agencies, for large corporations and non-profit organizations, as well as multinational organizations. He is recipient of a number of awards and has coauthored several books and monographs. He is a graduate of the University of New Orleans, and received his Ph.D. in 1974 from Miami University. He has completed post-doctoral work at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences at Stanford University, the University of Virginia and Senior Managers in Government Program at Harvard University.

Bryane Michael is currently at the University of Oxford where he has taught over 100 students and over 800 executives. He is simultaneously serving as anti-corruption advisor to Ukraine and Moldova. His previous work almost 5 years working at the World Bank and the OECD – where he advised on anti-corruption programmes in Nicaragua, Bolivia, Russia and Turkey. He also serves on the Board of Directors of 4 companies and NGOs around the world. He has published over 20 peer-reviewed academic articles on anti-corruption and has advised organisations such as Oxfam, CalPERS, DfID, UNDP, EU, and Aviva. He has done his post-graduate work in economics at Harvard and Oxford and speaks English, Spanish, French, some Russian and Turkish.

Drago Kos is chairman of the Commission for the Prevention of Corruption in Slovenia and president of the Group of States Against Corruption (GRECO). Mr. Kos directs the work of the Commission, which deals with prevention of conflicts of interests of 5000 Slovenian functionaries, implementation of the national anti-corruption strategy and introduction of integrity plans (risk assessment mechanisms) into all public institutions in Slovenia. As president of GRECO, which consists of 46 countries, he manages peer monitoring of national anti-corruption measures in the member states and oversees implementation of mandatory recommendations. He is also member of COGEL (Council on Governmental Ethics Laws, organization with 300 member institutions, based in the USA) Global Affairs Committee, which deals with outreach activities of COGEL. Mr. Kos has extensive experience in organized crime-, money laundering- and anti-corruption-counseling and policy advising in European and CIS countries.
